

## **Lake Angelus Boating Rules**

**February 2021**

In addition to the Marine Safety Act, Lake Angelus has adopted its own set of ordinances and rules to assure enjoyment of the lake in a safe manner. Lake Angelus has an excellent safety record, and all boaters are urged to observe the Lake Angelus ordinances and rules in an effort to maintain that good record. The following are the Lake Angelus Boating rules:

1. The launch and/or use of internal combustion engines upon the waters of Lake Angelus is prohibited for purposes other than, (i) the operation of conventional watercraft (other than pontoon boats) powered by inboard four-cycle engines, provided that such conventional watercraft shall not exceed 25 feet in length or exceed 6,100 pounds dry weight, or (ii) the operation of pontoon boats (as defined in the Zoning Code) powered by an inboard four-cycle engine, or (iii) the operation of pontoon boats (as defined in the Zoning Code) powered by one outboard four-cycle, CARB 3-STAR rating or better, maximum 200 horsepower engine manufactured in 2021 or thereafter. Diesel and two-cycle internal combustion engines are prohibited.
2. All powerboats must be maintained and operated in such a manner as to avoid excessive noise, smoke or fumes which would be objectionable to a person of ordinary sensibilities and to avoid the leaking or discharge of oil or fuel into the waters of the lake.
3. The racing of powerboats is prohibited. No powerboat may be operated in excess of 35 miles per hour.
4. It is prohibited to operate any vessel in excess of a slow, no-wake speed within 200 feet of any shore, dock, raft, marked or occupied swimming area, or any other vessel moored at anchor, except when water skiers are being picked up or dropped off with due regard for the safety of persons or property on an otherwise lawful manner.
5. Power driven water sleds, personal watercraft (such as WaveRunners, Sea-Doos, Jet Skis, etc.), miniature powerboats, racing boats, kite boards, and houseboats are prohibited. No boats shall be used for commercial purposes.
6. No power-driven boat shall be operated in excess of a slow, no-wake speed before 9 a.m. and after 8 p.m. from Memorial Day through Labor Day and before 9 a.m. and after 7 p.m. after Labor Day to Memorial Day. To be approved on a yearly basis by the City Council, on week days only, skiers may use the slalom course after 7 a.m., but must proceed to and from the slalom course at a slow, no-wake speed.
7. No Lake Angelus resident shall allow anyone, other than immediate family, to access the Lake, in any season, without being accompanied by a resident.

8. Lake Angelus residents are prohibited from allowing guests to launch boats onto the Lake. For purposes of this rule, Lake Angelus residents shall be considered as: (1) the owner of the Lake Angelus property along with the owners' family members residing with the owner at the Lake Angelus property, or (2) the occupant of the Lake Angelus property along with the occupant's family members residing with the occupant at the Lake Angelus property where such occupant has possession and access to the property by virtue of a lease, in which case the owner of the property shall be prohibited from launching or using boats on the Lake during the time of such lease term.
9. No boats, including power boats, sailing boats, canoes, kayaks and any other vessels shall be launched onto the Lake without cleaning the bottom of such boats and disposing of any bilge water from such boats which may potentially introduce adverse invasive species into the waters of Lake Angelus.
10. Lake Angelus adheres to Michigan's "counterclockwise rotation" inland lake rules.

12. Carbon monoxide "cloud" and propeller dangers are very real. Everyone should be seated when the boat is in operation, no one should be hanging on the transom and you should always turn the engine off when passengers are preparing for watersports.
13. Be sure the way is clear ahead of you and, remember, sailboats have the "Right of Way".
14. Navigation lights must be turned on at sunset. Dock lights should only be used while pulling up to the dock.
15. Lake Angelus rules and Michigan and Federal laws require MC numbers to be displayed, and registrations must be up-to-date and on board. It's the law.
16. Life jackets must be available for everyone on board and must be worn by those skiing, surfing, wakeboarding, tubing, etc.
17. Maritime law has always held the captain responsible for safety and wake damage.
18. It is illegal and extremely dangerous to operate a boat under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
19. Remember to always have a dedicated spotter when towing someone. Even when not doing watersports it is advisable to have a designated individual to provide another set of eyes.
20. It is every boater's responsibility to know and follow federal and state laws that apply to inland lakes, as well as, Lake Angelus Boating Rules.
